## The Istituto Italiano di Cultura in Hamburg Roberto Carballo investigates

Founded in the early Fifties by Italy's Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the Istituto Italiano di Cultura has 91 centres worldwide, and of the seven in Germany we are lucky enough to have one right on our doorstep here in Hamburg-Rotherbaum. It is located at Hansastraße 6 inside a private villa that the Italian state acquired in 1953, and which was built back in 1911 by Martin Haller.

The IIC offers a wonderful all-round service, targeting culturally-interested learners of Italian as well as native speakers. In abstract terms, they aim to create and foster intercultural contacts, to provide information about Italian life, culture and institutions, to promote cultural events, to help integrate Italian emigrants in Germany as well as keeping their cultural links with home alive, to assist Italian students and scientists here, and to stimulate interest in the Italian language.

In practical terms, fulfilling these objectives involves an Impressively comprehensive list of activities and services. The Istituto's library (open Tues., Thurs. and Fri. from 10 until 1, and Wed. from midday until 8 p.m.) comprises 10,000 volumen as well as Italian magazines and daily newspapers. They appened a video library last October, which will shortly be followed by a media centre with CD-Roms plus internet facilities. Two years ago, in conjunction with the Società Dante Allation, they launched an examination centre alongside their untilling language courses, which are offered at all learninglocals, as well as conversation courses, intensive courses, literary appropriation between introductions to Italian cookery and proposations and the "Certificato della Competenza Talland and Halland come 1.2 dell'Università degli Studi di Roma Tre" which represents a level of linguistic competence comparable to that of the Cambridge Proficiency examination. The Winter Turm starts on 6th September, but it may still be possible for some late registrations to be accepted.

in addition to all this, the IIC offer translation services, as well as additiony services for young people seeking a traineeship in the cultural or media fields in Italy itself. And their cultural events programme is respectable by any standards: regular

concerts, lectures, author readings, art exhibitions, and original-language films (the latter being screened virtually every Tuesday evening - 7 p.m. - in the library, at no charge).

The man responsible for organising and co-ordinating this ambitious programme is Dr. Sergio Scapin, the Cultural Attaché from the Italian Consulate-General. A highly cosmopolitan personality, the Arts degree he obtained in Rome focused on Scandinavian languages and literature, and during his

studies he won three 9-month scholarships to study at the universities of Lund, Copenhagen and Oslo. He then joined the Cultural Office of the Italian Embassy in Oslo, moving 11 years later to a similar post in San Francisco for four years. After a subsequent two years at the Foreign Ministry in Rome he was appointed to his present post here in Hamburg. But his wife - is from Switzerland!

Dr. Scapin very much enjoys the scope his work offers for active involvement in cultural life, despite the long hours and many organisational headaches. In his own words: "One particular feature of Hamburg residents that has struck me is their unusually high degree of active interest in meeting authors and watching films - even on warm, sunny evenings we can count on audiences of between 30 and 40. My impression is that people here are highly receptive to, and appreciative of, our Italian language, culture, cuisine, wines and fashions, which makes it all the easier for me to feel truly "at home" here. Five years ago a society was founded here - something absolutely unique to Hamburg - called the "Comitato di collaborazione culturale", to promote Italian culture in the city. Many leading cultural protagonists are members - the Senator responsible for

cultural affairs, Christina Weiß, as well as artistic directors from the worlds of theatre, films and music, representatives of the university and many more areas."

Highlights of the September programme include a chamber concert from L'Offerta Musicale di Venezia in the Musikhalle (kleiner Saal) at 8 p.m. on Tuesday the 21st; an exhibition of sculptures by Italian artist Nicoletta Braccioni from Fano and paintings by Hamburg-born Angela Mrositzki - both of whom live and work in Urbania, Marche - opening at 7 p.m. on Sunday the 26th at the Landdrostei Pinneberg; and a lecture from Georg Borchardt (in German) on "Felix Mendelssohn and Goethe in Italy" in the Istituto's library at 7 p.m. on Thursday the 30th.

Anyone can attend most of the Istituto's public events, but members receive price-reductions as well as use of the library and a full regular briefing on forthcoming events (in the form of a booklet which is published three times per year). Membership costs DM 60 annually, or DM 90 for couples. China, and these, together with Persian master carpet-makers, make carpets to patterns supplied by the company. Almost, anyway, as sometimes the Persian experts impose their own colour preferences at the last minute; but that just adds to the individuality of the final product. On the first floor of the new store you can view hundreds of stunning carpets and rugs - ideal for adding a finishing touch to the home - and there are even more in the Free Port warehouses. Customers can, on request, take a carpet home on approval to check the effect of the lighting and other furnishings on the piece.

The company also clean and repair carpets in Hamburg. And you won't have a language problem: staff in both the carpet and lingerie sections can advise you thoroughly in German, English, French, Persian, Brazilian Portuguese and Arabic.

On the ground floor, ECH are currently presenting their own collection. Entitled "La Nature", it comprises ladies' knitwear in silk and cashmere, underwear and nightwear, tops and seamless bodies. The bodies are made in China on specially-designed fine-grade knitting machines that basically produce shaped tubes, ensuring a smooth finish; the materials used are ecologically untainted silks and wild silks. There is a separate machine to cater for each permutation of proportions and sizes - unique in the whole world. It cost Chavoshinia DM 20 million to develop the system. The "Niendorfer Factory Outlet" also offers cut-price shoes and clothing by a variety of designers, including Versace, Gucci and Valentino.
